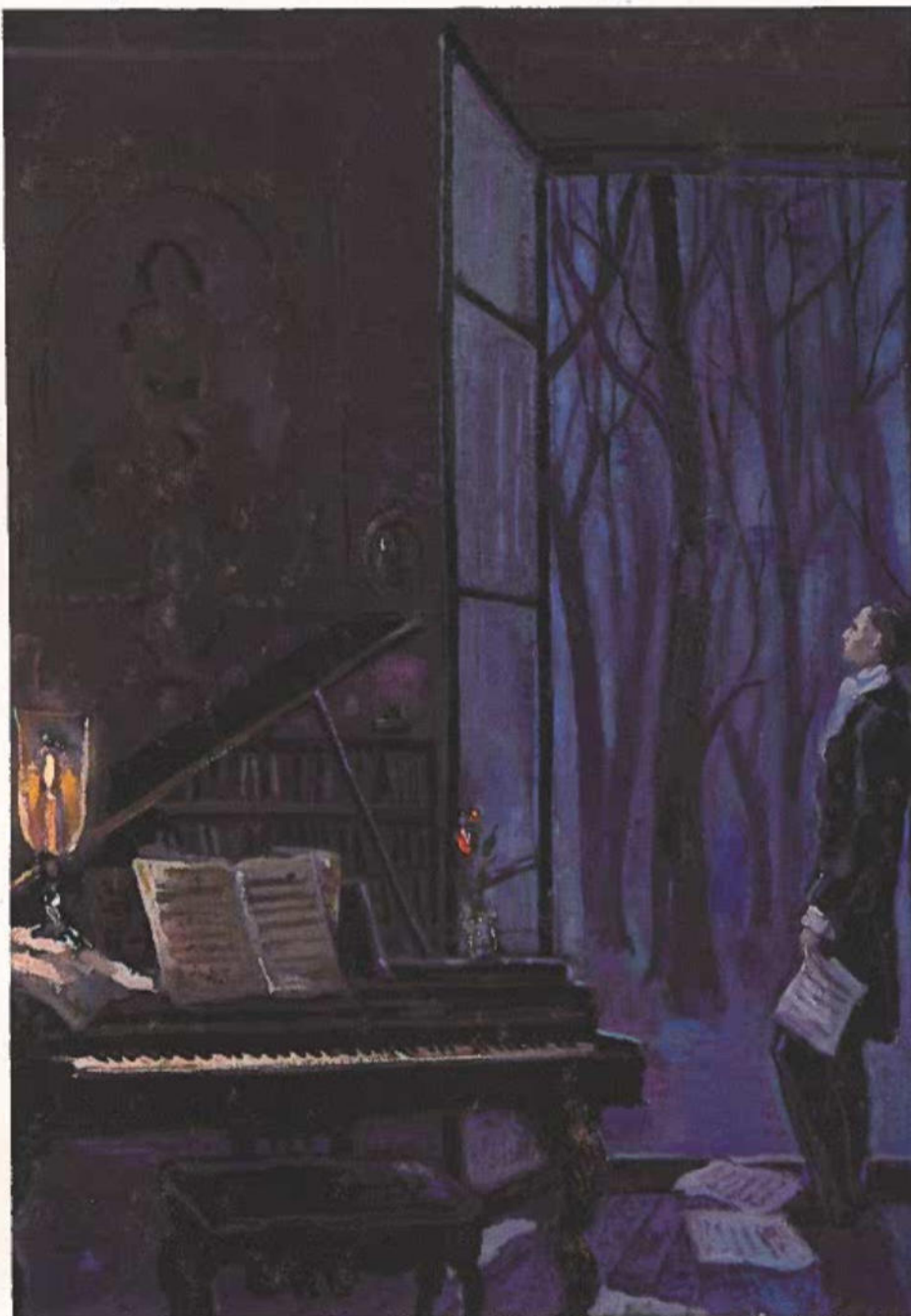

Heavier Profits Tax Proposed

**Connally Would Overhaul Corporate Gains
Levy and Take More of War Earnings.**

Washington, Jan. 12 (A. P.).—A thorough overhauling of the excess profits tax system and the enactment of drastic levies which would skim off the major share of corporation earnings from war production operations were proposed today by Senator Connally, Democrat, of Texas, a member of the Senate Finance Committee.

Amid signs that Congress was growing impatient at the reputed failure of the Treasury to explore new fields of taxation, Senator Connally said that he was certain there would be strong support for upward revision of levies which now range from 35 to 60 per cent on profits classed as "excess."

"Some of these companies are making fortunes out of defense contracts," the Texan told reporters. "We can get some of the money from them and we ought to overhaul the excess profits tax thoroughly."

This might involve, he said, a change in the method of computing such taxes. Corporations now have the alternative of figuring their excess profits levies on the basis of their invested capital or on the standard of past profits.

George Opposes Formula.

The invested capital formula, favored by the Treasury Department in the past, has been opposed by Chairman George,

Democrat, of Georgia, of the Finance Committee, who contended that many corporations with large capital stock issues thus avoided paying a fair share of taxes on admittedly large profits.

Influential legislators also were reported to have under consideration a Treasury suggestion for establishment of a graduated scale of regular and surtax corporation levies instead of the 30 per cent tax that now prevails on net incomes above \$25,000 yearly. The excess profits tax is in addition to these levies.

While there were some suggestions that this tax be raised to as high as 70 per cent on some of the largest incomes, experts said this might work a hardship on the small investor in a large concern. If the company made mammoth profits, the investor might find 70 per cent of his dividends taken in tax while an investor in a smaller company would lose much less in levies because of smaller profits there.

Only routine business was on the calendar in the House and Senate today.

907 Air Wardens Join Up.

Enrollment for air raid wardens showed a sharp falling off yesterday, with a total of 907, of which 697 were men and 210 women, bringing the grand total since June to 226,024 for the five boroughs.

McClelland Undergoes Operation.

Philadelphia, Jan. 12 (A. P.).—Dr. George W. McClelland, provost of the University of Pennsylvania, underwent an appendix operation Saturday night. His condition yesterday was reported good.

"Some of these companies are making fortunes out of defense contracts," the Texan told reporters. "We can get some of the money from them and we ought to overhaul the excess profits tax thoroughly."

This might involve, he said, a change in the method of computing such taxes. Corporations now have the alternative of figuring their excess profits levies on the basis of their invested capital or on the standard of past profits.

George Opposes Formula.

The invested capital formula, favored by the Treasury Department in the past, has been opposed by Chairman George,

Democrat, of Georgia, of the Finance Committee, who contended that many corporations with large capital stock issues thus avoided paying a fair share of taxes on admittedly large profits.

Influential legislators also were reported to have under consideration a Treasury suggestion for establishment of a graduated scale of regular and surtax corporation levies instead of the 30 per cent tax that now prevails on net incomes above \$25,000 yearly. The excess profits tax is in addition to these levies.

While there were some suggestions that this tax be raised to as high as 70 per cent on some of the largest incomes, experts said this might work a hardship on the small investor in a large concern. If the company made mammoth profits, the investor might find 70 per cent of his dividends taken in tax while an investor in a smaller company would lose much less in levies because of smaller profits there.

Only routine business was on the calendar in the House and Senate today.

Enrollment for air raid wardens showed a sharp falling off yesterday, with a total of 907, of which 697 were men and 210 women, bringing the grand total since June to 226,024 for the five boroughs.

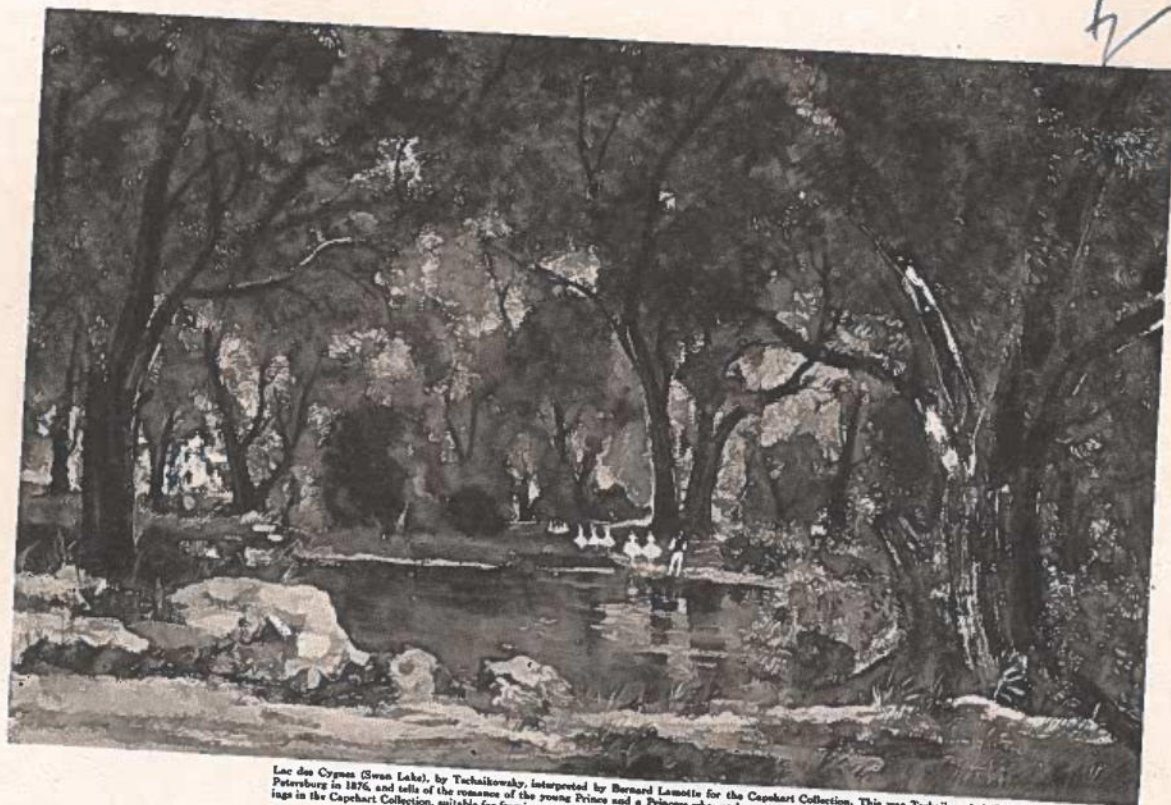
