Coury Elected President For Third Time

Michael J. Coury was reelected to a third term as president of the Midwest Federation of American Syrian-Lebanese Clubs at the organization's 41st annual convention held August 4-7 at the Hilton Inn in Des Moines, Iowa. The president is associate principal at Wentzville High School in Wentzville, Missouri.

Other officers elected by the 700 delegates in attendance were first vice president-Edward J. McMurray (Peoria, Illinois); second vice president-James J. Kassouf (Cleveland, Ohio); third vice president-Edward M. Salem (Des Moines, Iowa); executive secretary-Mary L. Salem (Des Moines, Iowa); and treasurer-Phyllis A. Joseph (Cleveland, Ohio).

Elected to the executive board were Dr. Elias Ayoub (Cleveland, Ohio), George Bryan (Zanesville, Ohio), Fred Eckrosh (Des Moines, Iowa), and Sam Farhat (Lansing, Michigan).

Special awards presented were: "Man of the Year" - George Borane (Michigan City, Indiana); and "Woman of the Year" - Amelia Mosos (Buffalo, New York).

College scholarships in the amount of \$500 each were awarded to: Michell Caulfiel (Des Moines, Iowa); Michelle Farha (Omaha, Nebraska); Christopher Herro (Milwaukee, Wisconsin); and Sharon Saigh (Omaha, Nebraska).

The Midwest Federation of American Syrian-Lebanese Clubs, representing 500,000 Americans of Arabic-speaking heritage in 16 Midwestern states, endorsed resolutions to: (1) commend President Jimmy Carter for his continued efforts to bring a permanent and lasting peace to the Middle East; (2) commend Secretary of State Cyrus Vance for his efforts to bring peace to the Middle East, and to commend him for his efforts to provide humanitarian aid to Lebanon; and (3) acknowledged and accepted TWA's formal apology for some previous advertisements degrading the Arabic language.

Honorary President Dies



James Arrieh, first and only Honorary President of the Midwest Federation, died in Milwaukee, Wisconsin on August 26 at age 84.

He is survived by a son, Marshall, past President of the Midwest Federation, and another son, Brahim, and two daughters, Yvonne, married to Charles Anthony, and Dr. Fay Frick, Professor of Art at San Diego University, and also ten grandchildren and one great-grandchild, Sam Saad III. His wife, Helen, died in 1971.

Mr. Arrieh was born in Lebanon, and he came to the United States in 1906. He was married here in 1917 to Helen Herro. He operated a grocery store, and he was also in the real estate and insurance business. He retired in 1949.

He was very active in the Lebanese Syrian American Club of Milwaukee, and served as its president, and for many years as its trustee.

He was one of the founders of the Midwest Federation in 1936, and served a term as its treasurer. In 1973 he was named Honorary President of the Midwest Federation for his many years of service.

He was also one of the founders who built St. George's Milkite Church in Milwaukee in 1917. For many years he served as a trustee and later as a member of the parish council.

He took part in many political campaigns and civic affairs in Milwaukee. As a leader with great energy and foresight, he was widely known and respected among the many persons who came to know him in his community, in the Midwest and in Lebanon.

Indianapolis Eagerness Shows

Three members of the American Syrian Lebanese Brotherhood of Indianapolis, Indiana attended the Des Moines convention this summer. That sparked a renewed interest by the Indianapolis club in the Midwest Federation. They asked that the next Federation Board Meeting be sponsored by them.

The Board Meeting took place at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Indianapolis on November 11-12. The weekend's activities included a hospitality reception Friday evening and a banquet and half on Saturday evening.

Past President, George Borane, of Michigan City, Indiana was honored at the banquet as "Man of the Year".

At the Board Meeting, reports were received from various Federation committees. Minor George, Chairman of the International Committee, reviewed developments in Lebanon, and commented that reconstruction was proceeding steadily. Sam Saad, President of the National Federation, stated that the organization is being strengthened, and urged continued support from the Midwest Federation.

The Indianapolis host club's revitalized interest in the Midwest Federation prompted it to bid for the next Midwest Federation convention. Its bid was accepted by the Board. The convention will be held August 3 to 6 in the beautiful new Sheraton Hotel near the airport. The last Midwest Federation convention held in Indianapolis was 32 years ago in 1946.

The officers of the club are: Vince Todd, President, Sam Ajamie, Vice President, Margaret Nahas, Secretary and Mrs. Alfred Shikany, Treasurer. Club member Phillip Mallof is governor for the State of Indiana.

Bashir Gemayel Feted in Chicago

A banquet honoring Bashir Gemayel, the son of Lebanese leader Pierre Gemayel, was given on December 15 in Chicago. Presiding as toastmaster at the affair was Joseph Shaker of Chicago. More than three hundred of the city's Lebanese community came to hear the leader of the Lebanese United Forces speak. Local members of the United Lebanon Appeal also helped in the preparations for the banquet.

Sheik Bashir Gemayel, who heads the Phalangist party in Lebanon, said that the late Lebanese fighting, which killed 60,000 people in his country, was a war between the Lebanese people and 600,000 foreigners backed by extremists from throughout the world. Gemayel said that "some people" thought they could get to Israel by first destroying Lebanon. "We did not have foreigners fighting for us. We paid the price for every inch of freedom and will remain masters in Lebanon," he vowed. He appealed to Lebanese Americans to be united and organized. "Then and only then, we can rely on your support to help us keep Lebanon one. We will never agree to give one inch of Lebanon to anyone," he said.

Gemayel's one month North American tour began in Detroit on November 17 and ended in Chicago. The Lebanese leader also visited Cleveland, Boston, Fall River (Mass.), New York City, Halifax, Canada, Montreal, Canada, Houston, Washington D.C. and Los Angeles. In Washington, he explained the Lebanese situation from an internal viewpoint to Philip Habib, a Lebanese holding a high office in the U.S. Department of State.

The South Dakota Association of Arab Americans (SDAAA) has established a Center for Near Eastern Studies at Augustana College in Sioux Falls, S.D. The college has employed Masoud Barzanji, a Kurdish refugee, as a resource person. Mr. Barzanji has devoted much of his time to building resource materials at the campus library. Through the community college, two noncredit courses were offered in the spring semester, "The Mideast and Why We Should Know About It" and "Beginning Arabic". The response from the community was so demanding that additional courses will be offered during the summer session.

Since the Center is operating on a one year grant, contributions are being sought to continue the program and obtain more materials. For further information, contact Marianne Skaff, 1807 South Main Street, Sioux Falls, S.D. 57105.

The SDAAA has donated an Arab Culture Kit to the Sioux Falls School System. The kit includes a complete curriculum guide, visual aids, and upon request, a guest speaker.

Six families of refugees from Kurdistan have moved to Sioux Falls. The community has made a sincere effort to assist their Arabic speaking cousins in their new life of freedom.



Midwest Federation Protests Israeli Invasion of Lebanon

In a press release issued March 20, the Midwest Federation of American Syrian-Lebanese Clubs asked President Jimmy Carter to use his influence and power to bring an end to the Israeli hostilities in Lebanon.

Michael J. Coury, President of Midwest Federation, charges that the Israeli invasion of Lebanon carries with it the stamp "MADE IN AMERICA"! He states in a letter to President Carter that the Israeli use of American-made arms, including F-15 fighter-bombers and anti-personnel cluster bombs (CBU's), was in violation of the Arms Export Control Act. "When Israel marches 17 miles into Lebanon and bombs Lebanese cities from the land, air, and sea, Israel is no longer using American arms for defensive purposes", says Coury.

In condemning terrorist acts from any parties--Israelis or Arabs--Coury charges that Israel's stubborn refusal to recognize the rights of the Palestinian people has led to "frustrated acts being committed by frustrated peoples".

The Midwest Federation of American Syrian-Lebanese Clubs, representing 500,000 Americans of Arabic-speaking heritage in 16 Midwestern states, also called for Israeli adherence to United Nations Resolution 242 as another prerequisite for a lasting Middle East peace solution.

Dear Mr. President:

The overkill invasion of Lebanon by Israel is a violation of the sovereign rights and integrity of our friend Lebanon. Israel's refusal to withdraw to her borders only underscores her aims for further territorial expansion.

Villages were literally bombed out and hundreds of innocent people were killed and maimed, including women and children. Perhaps, our massive over-supply of armaments to Israel only serves to encourage these repeated violations. Furthermore, Israel cannot resist the use of weapons supplied for defensive purposes such as "cluster bombs" when violating the rights and sovereignty of her neighbors.


A durable peace in the Middle East must include withdrawal to 1967 Borders and establishment of a home land for the Palestinians. Such a tiny Palestinian State can never be strong enough to cuse Israel her unwarranted concern or justify her objections to this solution; particularly in light of American defense spending on Israel's behalf.

Mr. President, I know you are doing everything within your power to further the cause of human rights. The millions of Americans of our heritage highly respect your continuing courage to resist the pressure of special interest groups.

I want to assure you of our total loyalty to you and to our beloved United States of America; first, last, and always. If we can be of any assistance to you, to further the cause of justice and peace in that troubled area, I am ready to answer your call.


INDIANAPOLIS CONVENTION DRAWS 1,000 ELECTS PEORIA MAN AS PRESIDENT

George maintained a B average in high school, and received many scholarship offers from Illinois schools, but chose J.C.U. for its strength in his major field of accounting.

SOUTH DAKOTA WOMAN ADOPTS CHILD FROM LEBANON

Marianne Skaff is a woman involved in many activities in her community of Sioux Falls, South Dakota. She holds a PH.D. in Psychology, works for the State Department of Labor, is chairman of the Governor's committee on minorities, founder and president of the South Dakota Association of Arab Americans and president of the South Dakota Epilepsy Foundation. In recent years she has been involved in the most rewarding activity of all, being an adoptive parent to a homeless child from Lebanon.

In relating the story of her adoption of her son Aneese, Marianne reveals, "Aneese will be 4 years old on January 25, 1979. It is really quite difficult to think of a time when he was not a part of my life."

Recalling the experience of Aneese's adoption brings back some unpleasant memories also. Throughout 1973 and 1974, Marianne had tried to adopt a child through social service agencies, private doctors and international adoption agencies. She was told that it was impossible to adopt a Lebanese orphan. Finally, she was given the name of a Lebanese consulate, who had assisted Americans in adopting children in the past. After months of letters and phone calls, she received a letter from the Creche St. Vincent, an orphanage in Beirut, stating that it was impossible to consider her request since there were no children available for adoption, and there was a waiting list that could take months or years.

After receiving word from a priest in Lebanon that she could adopt a 2½ year old girl, Marianne arrived in Beirut within two days. Soon after her arrival she learned that it was impossible to adopt the child, and as she states, "to use a cliche to the fullest meaning, I was broken hearted."

During the next two days, Marianne spent 18 hours a day on the streets of Beirut contacting every hospital, orphanage and individual to try to find a child to adopt. Finally, she saw the Patriarch of Lebanon, presenting him with a letter of introduction by a mutual friend of the Patriarch, Mr. Tobia Hachem of the Mid-east Travel Bureau in Chicago. The Patriarch told Marianne that he had heard of her, and that she had "broken the hearts of Lebanon." He gave instructions to the Creche St. Vincent to help her. The next day when she went back to the creche, the mother superior said they had a 9 day old boy whom she could adopt. According to Marianne, "the moment I held him my world began to change. It was as if God himself had placed the child in my arms."

She was told that the boy weighed only 2½ lbs. and was very sick. She then arranged for a famous pediatrician to examine her son. He said that the child's survival was uncertain, and the baby would need intensive treatment. By the end of 10 days Aneese began to respond to the medication. The physician later told her that the recovery was unbelievable. "By all the medical facts, that child did not have a chance. I truly believe God has saved him for you."

It took six weeks of constant dealings with the American Embassy to complete the necessary papers and approve the immigration. The doctors advised Marianne that she remain in Lebanon with Aneese until he weighed 5 lbs. After three months of struggle and red tape, she finally returned to the U.S. with her new son.

Aneese is now a normal, happy 4 year old, who reads, writes and speaks Spanish and Arabic. His name, which means sociable, is very descriptive of his personality. Marianne would like to return to Lebanon in the late fall of 1979 to adopt another child. She has been promised a child from the Creche, since they agree that a child should not be reared alone.

Even though the years of war have left many children orphaned, it is more difficult to adopt than before. The Lebanese want to retain as many children as they can to rebuild Lebanon. Surviving relatives who cannot care for the children would rather see them placed in an orphanage than have them reared by others. Marianne suggests that anyone wishing to help the orphaned children do so through donations to the orphanages. International money orders can be made out to Creche St. Vincent, and sent to her, to be delivered, at the following address: 1807 South Main Street, Sioux Falls, SD 57105.

Marianne feels that it was no more difficult to adopt a child as a single parent, such as herself, than for a married couple. The most difficult part is meeting all the needs of a child as a single parent.

The question most people have asked Marianne is "why?". To her the answer is simple, love. "We all have a lot of love to give, so why not share it with those who really need what we have to give."

FALL BOARD MEETING MIXES BUSINESS WITH PLEASURE

"My three main objectives during my administration will be to increase the scholarship fund, expand membership and growth and help Lebanon," stated President McMurray to those attending the Midwest Federation fall board meeting in Milwaukee on October 27-29 at the Downtown Ramada Inn.

Ted Hazer of Omaha, announced that his club raised \$200.00 at a dance for the benefit of needy students. President McMurray congratulated the Omaha Club for its endeavors and urged other member clubs to hold similar functions for raising money for the scholarship fund.

Tom Joseph, Chairman of the Scholarship Committee disclosed March 1, 1979 as the deadline for all scholarship applications. "The Scholarship Committee regrets turning down applications when they arrive after the deadline, so it's important that applicants file their applications on time," stated Joseph.

It was also announced that a telegram had been sent to President Carter asking him to stop the bloodshed in Lebanon, and to recognize President Sarkis and to send aid to help restore Lebanon and its people.




