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told his wife "you might hear something at night. He might come. Don't go out to see him" he told his wife, and again he went out hunting and at night he did not come in. And this woman heard a man. He shouted out at night near the camp and she knew what her husband had told her "don't go out to see him" "I might go out to see him" she thought. The man came in. He sat down at the back of the lodge. And this woman she gave him some food. "This isn't the kind of plate that I use" this man said. And she tried another way. She got white feathers and used them as a plate. "This is not the kind" he said. And again she tried another way. She got leggings. They were beaded. She used them as a plate. "nearly right" he said. And again she tried another way. She used her dress as a plate. "nearly right" he said. And she commenced to think about it. She used herself as a plate. She put food on herself. "That is what I want" he said. He commenced to eat and he said "Sometimes one has to hit the

plate" he said, and he cut open her belly. He pulled out babies. One he threw near the door and one at the back of the lodge. Then he went out, and a little while later at night her husband came back. There was no light. He cried out "where are you", but there was no answer, and he understood at once. "I told you" he said. He went in and saw that his wife's belly was open. He fixed his wife. He put her in bed. He went back on the hills, till toward morning he went home. He went in his tipi. He saw where the babies were playing. Hid bow and arrows were sticking up. He thought it funny. He took breakfast and when he finished he went back to the hills. In the evening he went home. And again he saw his arrows were sticking up, and he understood. He stayed over night in his tipi and in the morning he went out to see. He went up a hill and went back quickly along a gulch near his tipi very care fully and close he hid himself. He heard them. One of his boys said "Come on

my friend" let us play. "All right" he said (the other) and they picked up the arrows. They stuck them in the ground. They commenced to gamble at the arrow game. This men he went close. He saw his boys. They were playing the arrow game. He jumped in and caught one of them. The boy bit and scratched him. After a while the man quieted him and said to him in a whisper " I will go out, play with my arrows. You catch the other boy and shout out 'Father' I will jump in and catch him, he said" "All right" said the boy. And the man went a long way off. He went over a hill. He came back quickly along a gulch. He got back near his tipi and laid himself. He list ened and after a while he heard them. "Let us play" said the boy who was caught by their father. The other boy was wild. He said "No. our father caught you". And again he said to him "Let us plat" "No, our father caught you" he said. "No he didn't catch me. I have been biting him" he said. "Come on". Then they commenced to play. They picked up the bow and arrows. They

commenced to gamble in play. After a while the first grabbed the other and he said "come on father. I have caught him". And their father jumped in. He caught him and he said to him "stop crying. I will make you bows and arrows. Mou can play" he said to him. "All right" the boy said. "Make a bow and arrows. There should be two arrows, one red and the other black. And it should be the same way for the other boy" he said. And the man did what he had said to him. And when he finished the bow and arrows the boy said to him "Make a sweat lodge. Paint the willows red, and there would be one hundred in number" he said, "and take my mother in" The man did so and when he had finished the sweat lodge he took his wife in. And one of the boys shot upwards and said "Get out. Run out" he said. And he shot a second shot upwards "Get out, run out" he said. And the sweat lodge it was shaking. And the other boy did the same, and when he finished shooting, "get out, run out" he said. And their mother ran out. Their father was glad. They commenced to live as

married people again. And after a little while these boys became large and used to go around. They used to shoot. And their father told them "where the thick brush is. don't go over there. There is a man living there who is mean" he told them. "We understand" they said to him. And in a little while later they said "Let us go over where the brush is thick, where our father said " and they went over and they got over There was one tipi. They walked in. An old man lived there. He said to them. "You are the ones, my grandchildren" he said. "I want to look for my lice" he said to them. "All right" they said. Then they commenced to dig for his lice. And they saw there was a hole on the top of his head. And this man had long hair like ropes. In a wittle while he went to sleep and one of these boys put a rock on the fire and when it was red-hot he put it in the man's head and his hairs were tied. They killed him. And they pulled out his hair. They went back home. And when they had got home they gave it to their father. "You can use that as a rope" they

said to him. "We killed the man that you spoke of" they said. "How did you kill him" their father said to them. "We picked lice for him and he was asleep and we put a rock in his head and that is how we killed him" they said: "All right. you are all right" he said to them. and a little later he said to them. "where a tree is down below a nest is on the treeyoung eagles live there" their father said to them. "Don't bother them" he said to them. After a while they said "Let us go over there" "all right" said the other. Then they went over. They got to the little eagles. One of the boys climbed up. He got hold of one and he said to him "How do the clouds look when your father comes?" and the young eagle said "They are black clouds when he comes" The boy got hold of the other one and said to him "How do the chouds look when your mother comes?" He twisted the young eagle's beak and the young eagle said "There is a big wind when my mother comes" A little later there were very black clouds and there was wind. One of the boys shot at a rock and said "If you can pull out this arrow, you can kill us" he said to the big

eagle. There was thick rain and the big eagle flew down; he got hold of the arrow and flew up with it, and when the arrow sprang back as an elastic, it smashed him on the rock and the other big eagle flew down and he did the same thing as the first big eagle. She was smashed and the boy pulled their feathers. He took these feathers home. They gave them to their father. "What is it?" he said to them, and "where that tree is we got them - and we killed the big eagles" they said. "All right, you are right" he said to them. And again he told them "Don't go near that tree which is broken off at the top. It kills persons" he said to them. "All right"they said. And later they went over to it. They got to it. They were standing near it. And that tree bent over towards them where they were, but they were not there. That tree smashed. They picked up the pieces. They took the wood home. They took it in. "Here is wood" they said to their mother. "Where did you get it?" she said to them. And they

said to her "Where that tree is. it bent over and it smashed and we picked it up" "Are you sure?" she said to them. "Yes we are sure"they said .. And their father said "Don't go over there. There are sage hens. Don't shoot them. They are not supposed to be shot" he said to them. And a little later they went over. They saw the sage-hens. They shot at them. They didn't hit them. They (the birds) flew away. And right away they saw wind. They started home. One got in and the other was blown far away. He stuck in the brush and later was found by an old woman and she said to him. "you are he, my grandchild, found-in-the-grass". She took him home where the camps were. She kept him and later the chief cried out and said "Whoever catches a wildfox, he shall marry my daughter" he said. And Found-in-the -grass said to his grandmother, "I am going to try to catch him" he said to his grandmother. And she said to him "You can't catch; you are too ugly" she said, and Found-in-the-grass wanted to try. And he tried to catch him and in the morning he caught a

wild fox. He (this fox) was best of all. And Crow. he also caught one. These were the two that were caught, and Foundin-the-grass was the one that caught the best one. And the one that Crow caught was not as good. And Found-in-the-grass and Crow were called by he that had the daughters; and his he said to the girls were told - "whom will you marry?" the oldest girl and she said "Crow will be the one to marry me - Found-inthe-grass is too ugly; she (her younger sister) can be the one to marry Dound-in-the-grass," said the oldest girl; and Found-in-the-grass married the youngest girl. and Crow was the one who married the oldest girl. And later Foundin-the-grass changed in appearance. He was good looking, and he was a big boy, and a little later Found-in-the-grass said to the chief that he should cry out- he said to him "tomorrow I will go out to see - I will look for buffalos" he said; and this chief cried out and said "Found-in-thegrass is going out in the morning, he is going to look for

buffalo" he said; and the next morning he went out and found buffalos. They all went; and they killed them all.

And he was always doing the same. They were not hungry any more, and Found-in-the-grassbecame chief. And this Crow was lazy. His wife did not like him. This is the end.

At night the moon was shining and the girls were lying down and were looking at the stars and one star, it was shining brighter than all the others. And one girl, she said, "Oh that star who is shining brightest, I wish he were my husband" she said. And another girl said "you mustn't say that" and they quit playing. In the morning those girls who were getting wood (the ones who were talking the night before) saw a Porcupine on a tree, and one girl said "I am going to catch up with that porcupine" she said- and she commenced to climb up to catch that porcupine - and she barely climbed up to him- the higher she climbed the more he climbed. One girl stood underneath -- she cried out --"come back" she said to her. The porcupine kept on climbing. "I will so on catch him" the other girl replied,

and after a while she did not hear while she was calling. "Well" said that porcupine to her. "I am he who shines brightest- I am the one who is to marry you" said that porcupine. There was a bunch of camps. Blue Bird's father was a chief. Blue Bird was a lazy boy. He slept all the time. He used to go around the camps. He met a boy with a friend. He called the boy Yellow Bird. After they went around the camps they went home. He told Yellow Bird to go home for a while. He told him that he, Blue Bird, was going to get married. He got married to Elk Woman. After he was married he told his father to wake him in the morning. His father told him to get up. His father said he had no red-headed eagles with yellow wings. "all right" He went right away. He got his bow that was out side and started off. His father began to look for him a little later when he had not come back. He asked other persons if they had seen him. They said they had seen him going off.

While he was going on he got into a spring. There were buffalo in the water. The buffalo began to come out when they saw him coming to the spring. As he walked towards

the spring he saw a buffalo sitting down in the mud. He stood close to him and punched him with his bow. He turned around and started home. He got home. His father heard when he got home. He stayed at home for a little while. Some one told him that a buffalo had a child. The baby said "Blue Bird is my father" The buffalo was coming towards the camp where Blue Bird was. He went out and saw her coming with a boy. The boy said "Here's my father" He ran towards Blue Bird. Blue Bird said "This is my boy" His wife came out. When she saw buffalo woman standing there she commenced to say some words - that buffalo wo man had the funniest looking hair on her head. Buffalo woman said the Elk woman had the funniest kind of looking eyes. They were jealous of each other. Buffalo woman felt sorry how she had talked with Elk woman. She then started off with the boy. While she was going toward the hills the first ridge she got on top of she saw quite a man sitting down. She went by on his left side. She got on the second ridge. When

she got over it there were two old men sitting down. She went by on their left side. She reached the third ridge. When they went over she saw three old men sitting down; she went by on their left side. The fourth ridge as they went down they saw four very old men sitting down. She went hy on the left side. These old men told her to go over where yon tipi was in the center of a bunch of buffalo. She went over. She went in this tipi. This was her father's tipi. So she stayed at her father's tipi. Then Blue Bird had commenced to look for his boy. He asked other people if they had seen them. When he was looking for his boy when he got back to his camp he called his friend Yellow Bird. He told him that he was going out and look for his boy; he also told his friend that he might look out for dust that went up to the sky and that would tell his friend that he was in trouble. So he started out and the last tipi he asked the old woman if she saw them going=towards=the=hilippast. She said she saw them going towards the hill. He followed her tracks. He

got on the first ridge, went down to the foot of the ridge. He saw a man sitting down and he told him that she had passed by on the left side. He got on the second ridge, at the foot he saw two old men sitting down. They told him she had passed by on the left side. When he got on the third ridge as he was going down he saw three very old men. They told him she had passed by. When he got to the fourth ridge as he was coming down he saw four old men. They told him she had passed by and was going to that tipi around which were the buffalo. They told him his boy looked almost like the yellow color of a buffalo calf. So he walked towards the tipi. His boy was told that he was coming. His boy ran towards him as he was coming. He then walked over and entered the tipi. When he got in his boy told him that the first thing to do they were going to run a foot race with the buffalo. His boy was going to run for him. He said he could run as well; that his boy might be beaten. He didn't want his boy to run . He preferred his son to beat the buffalo. He would take his

boy back home. They got ready for the races. There were four buffalo calves and Blue Bird. The buffalo stood in a string the way they were going to run. They started, two buffalo on each side of him. Before they started his boy told him to beat so they could go home at once. He won. When the race was over the boy told his father that they were going to make Blue Bird dance with the buffalo for all night, and if he didn't get sleepy or fall downwhile dancing he would have his boy. The dance was started. He didn't go to sleep. After the dance was over the boy told his father that they were going to sing all night, if he did not sleep until morning he could take his boy with him. They sung til morning, Blue Bird was awake. The third time they had him sing all night. That is how the Indians got the Buffalo dance. The boy told his father they were going to tell stories for four nights, and if he didn't sleep he could have his boy again. So they told him a story the first night. An old man told the story. He didn't sleep.

He was all right until the second morning. The second day all day till night, till the third night towards morning he was just about to fall asleep when his boy kept waking him up. The fourth day till night, till towards morning Blue Bird was very. His boy kept trying to wake him. but could not. He shook him hard and cried. Then boy quit He stepped aside and said to the old people who were telling stories that they beat him. They then got up and turned into old buffalo. They began to go around in a circle till he was crushed to pieces, till there was nothing left but The dirt went way up in the sky. Yellow Bird knew that he was gone by that sign. The dirt looked blue. One little feather, very small, of Blue Bird, was not destroyed. Yellow Bird said he was going to look for his friend. He started out. For a long while he was looking around for him He came back. The second time he started out. Then he found the place where they had destroyed him. While looking close to the ground he heard the voice of his friend. He could not

see where he was till he saw that little piece of feather. That was the way he found him. When he got him he began to turn towards the camp. Yellow bird was flying. They came in by the top of a tipi. The people cried out that Blue Bird was back home. Yellow Bird said "The buffalo are going to come". The buffalo started towards the camp. While going when they started for the camp they played wheel games. Yellow Bird said he would go back to see how far back they were. When he got to where the buffalo were, while they were playing the wheel game, he flew towards where the arrows were. He gotone of those arrows. He went back home with it. He showed the people the arrow. He said the buffalo were very close. The Blue Bird went to see how far the buffalo were. When they were camped they danced a spear dance. He flew down and got one of the spears. He flew back and showed the spear and said the buffalo were very close. Next Yellow Bird started out to see how far the Buffalo were. He had a piece of fat with him. When he got where they were camped they were dancing

the spear dance again. He flew down and got one of the spears and started back with it. There were magpies after him. They flew very fast. He flew up. down. every way but they were after him. He could not get away from them. He flew down a small mud hole. While close to the mud he dropped the The magpies stuck in the mud. He went home with the spear, showed it to the people and said the buffalo were very close. Blue Bird started out to see how far the buffalo were. He got to where they were. They were dancing the Crazy dance. He flew and got the crazy spear -- (the white spear, we call it). He started back home. They were after They nearly caught him. He shouted out to his friend (shout) Yellow Bird to throw out fat for him - Yellow, Bird did and he got away. He got to the camp. He said the people, sticking the spear to the ground "This spear tells the story right" The buffalo got to the camp. They camped all together. After this, white spear, being the last spear said "it shall never more be such kind of troubles, but all straightened out again.

That the Indians come to be good, that they might not touch the animals as they got the boy from them. After this was over they danced four kinds of dances as the buffalo had danced while coming. When these dances were over, it settled everything—all their trouble was over.

The beginning of the Arapahos was from the Sacred Pipe; there was all water, the pipe was on the water. The pipe was unbared, not tied up. The first thing the pipe did was to get all the animals that lived in the water in order that he might choose one to get the dirt under the water. He sent most of them but they did not get it, they came up drowned. But there were two, a duck and a turtle. They were both coming up with a little piece of mud from the bottom and the man commenced to pack the mud up in his hands, to dry it. He took off his moccasins and let the dirt on the soles. After it was dry he took it in his fingers and began to sing. He threw it all around while singing and it turned into land: He sang again, the land grew bigger. The third time he sang the land grew as far as he could see. The fourth time he sang there was more land than water. When he finished making land, the first Indian was a Mexican, the second a white man. The Mexican was asked how he was

The white man asked for all kinds of paints; also the Indian; at the same time asked for medicines, the white man one way and the Indian another. The reason why the Mexican got the corn was that as long as they had corn and the sacred pipe they would stay with the Arapahos.

After the animals were all named the best were picked out, he picked out a wild fox. He took off the hide and wrapped it around the sacred pipe; at the same time the Mexican gave a Navajo blanket to wrap the sacred pipe in order that he (the Mexican) might be more like an Arapaho. The man who made all said -"they way

they should keep the sacred pipe should be four sticks tied together that they might hang the sacred pipe; that they must not let the sacred pipe lie on the ground. He made a man of mud and a woman of mud. There was a woman then, and a man. He told him he might have moccasins. He told her "what kind of moccasin are you going to make?" The foman did not know. The man said she had better make it out of white buffalo hide, with hair on it. The Mexican said he had beads, have them to the man. This man gave it to his wife to put on the moccasins. The Mexican said he gave the bead that he might live with the Arapahos a long The man said he wanted a blanket. He told his wife to get it. She started in some direction. She found a white buffalo hide near by. She brought it to her husband. He told her to make a blanket out of the hide. This man took it and spread on the ground at the foot of the pipe. He called his wife to stand close to that hide. He got a sage brush and stuck it on the back of his head and around

each wrist, and some on the soles of each foot. Then she began to tan the hide. When she had it already she spread it on the ground, and sat on the middle and it was done. The man and woman were then parents. They had kept the sacred pipe. When they wanted to move some distance they said "How are we going to move" - the woman said that they would pack the pipe. the man said he would pack the four sticks. The man started on, the woman behind. They stopped. The man stuck up the sticks and the woman hung up the pipe. They camped. The sticks were called the legs of the pipe. The woman asked her husband how they were going to tie up the pipe. They had nothing. He pointed to the hide and said "go get that hide" She stepped a few steps and went a head. There was a hide of buckskin. She said - "how shall I cut it?" the man said: "look under the hide." There was a knife of rock under the hide. Then she began to cut the strings. She wrapped them around the sacred pipe. Now he told his wife

that they might move again. The woman commenced to pack the pipe; the strings were then half tied. They camped. They put up the sticks and then the pipe. The man carried the sticks and the woman the pipe. Where they camped she asked her husband (they had a horse then) how this horse might carry the pipe. The man said the horse was going to carry the pipe. While they camped they talked how they were going to get horses. This man told his wife to get a stick a ways from them. He gave his wife a stick to take it over to the other stick and tie them together. The other stick became a rope, the other one a horse. So she brought the horse which was a mare to him. She went back there was a stick there. She did as before. There was a stallion there. She told her husband that he might own the horse and she the mare. They moved camp again. The man told his wife to cut the some tall sleu grass, to cut two, to tie them on each side of the horse and lay the pipe on

the woman the mare. Ropes were made of horsehair. When they camped they got in the middle of the land they were going to stay in. That is why the Arapahos are living in the center of the land now and why the pipe is here.

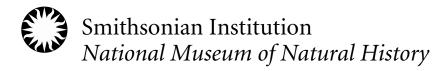
